- Dogs in the waiting room—We will be putting up posters to let patients know we are unable to have dogs in the waiting room— Dogs for the blind and disabled are able to come into the surgery.

First Contact Physiotherapy

If you ring the surgery and tell the receptionist you have a soft tissue, muscle and or joint pain, you will be offered an appointment with first contact physiotherapy. A digital appointment will be made for you usually within a few days – you will be sent a link via text, which you will click onto ready for your appointment. If you don't have access to the internet a telephone appointment will be arranged.

The role of First Contact Physiotherapists (FCPs) in Primary Care is to assess patients with soft tissue, muscle and joint pain and to decide on the most appropriate management pathway. FCPs are physiotherapists with expertise in the assessment and management of Musculoskeletal (MSK) conditions. They either can give physiotherapy advice or can refer you to the most appropriate service.

Please take the opportunity to use the service as there is a very long waiting time for routine physiotherapy appointments.
